### Paris

Michel Rybalka reports that the June program for the Groupe d'Études Sartriennes is still being devised and will be notified later, in particular on the site <a href="https://www.jpsartre.org">www.jpsartre.org</a>. L'Année sartrienne, no 18, to be published on that occasion, will aim to be a special issue for the occasion. An official commemoration is planned for 21st June at the Sorbonne. The conference of the GES will take place from 17th-18th June 2005 at the Sorbonne.

A large-scale exhibition on Sartre, directed by Mauricette Berne in collaboration with Michel Sicard and with the assistance of Michel Rybalka, will be on display at the Bibliothèque nationale de France-Tolbiac from 8 March to 31 August 2005.

A show, "Sartre on Jazz," directed by Gérard Thirioux, will run at the Lavoir moderne parisien, Paris, from 11-22 April 2005.

A conference on Paul Nizan is planned in Nantes in 2005.

### SARTRE NOTES

## Sartre and the Resistance

As Philippe Dagen tells us in an article published in Le Monde (25-26 juillet, 2004, p. 19), Daniel Cordier, who was the secretary of Jean Moulin and, subsequently, one of the leading art gallery owners in Paris, has undertaken to write his memoirs. In a short piece entitled "La Résistance de Saint-Germain-des Prés," Cordier tells us about an incident during one of his missions in France, when he was 22: "I went into the Café des Deux-Magots in July 1943 to meet Sartre. He had told me he wanted to be part of the resistance. We saw each other several times that summer and I asked him for a paper on the situation to send to London. I then brought it back to England when I returned there in March 1944. I also asked for similar pieces from Camus, Queneau, Vaillant [Vailland], and so on. Sartre, with whom I had arranged a meeting, was to take me to see Camus, who was in the Café de Flore. [...] Sartre took me to Camus who, it must be said, welcomed me rather coldly. Alain Laubreeau [Laubreaux] was not very far away, sitting on a wall seat. [...] To my mind, they [these intellectuals] seemed to me to be completely unrealistic. [...] But then, what could they do, these writers? They weren't prepared to fight. And the majority of them were on the left and were therefore opposed to de Gaulle. [...] The paper in question, written by Sartre, was published in a slightly reworked version at the request of Raymond Aron under the title "Paris sous l'occupation" in La France libre, [London], 49, 15th November 1944, pp. 9-18, and subsequently included in Situations III. (See also "Paris Under the Occupation," tr. Adrian van den Hoven, Sartre Studies International, vol.4, no.2, 1998, pp.1-15.)

### Simone de Beauvoir

Grell, Isabelle, & Kruse, Caroline. *Des jeunes filles exemplaires : Dolto, Zaza, Beauvoir* (Paris : Hachette Littératures, 2004). In a short review published in le *Magazine littéraire* (432, juin 2004, p. 90), Catherine Clément, also referring to *Correspondance croisée* between de Beauvoir and Bost, writes "If what Dolto accomplished in becoming a doctor is heroic, the accomplishment of de Beauvoir in terms of emotional and sexual liberation is incomparably more stimulating : amusing, liberated, sensitive, the Castor encourages us to live every moment to the full, even in war time."

### Albert Camus

The Bulletin d'information de la Société des Études camusiennes, 71, juillet 2004, published, along with a lot of other information, a list of 71 doctoral theses on Albert Camus completed between 1985 and 2003 and that are included on the database of the University of Paris X Nanterre.

The documenary *Albert Camus* (1913-1960), une tragédie du bonheur, produced by Jean Daniel and Joël Calmettes for the series "Un siècle d'écrivains" (1999) and dealing at some length with Sartre, was repeated on Arte on 4 July 2004.

### Foucault and Sartre

In a long and interesting interview "Les confessions de Michel Foucault," carried out in June 1975, but unpublished until its recent appearance in *Le Point*, 1er juillet 2004, pp. 82-93, Foucault responds to Roger-Paul Droit as follows: "Like almost all of my generation I was torn between marxism and phenomenology, not so much that which Sartre and Merleau-Ponty knew and practiced than the phenomenology present in Husserl's text from 1933-37 'La crise des sciences européennes', the 'Crisis,' as we called it. [...] During the years 1965-1968, [...] it was hard not to be a marxist[...]."

R.-P. Droit: Sartre said: "Foucault has no sense of history." Foucault: I find it an enchanting phrase! I would like people to put it as an epigraph to all that I do, because I think that it is profoundly true. If having a sense of history means reading the works of great historians with respectful care, overtake them on their right with a smidgeon of existential phenomenology, on the left with a touch of historical materialism, if having a sense of history means taking a ready-made view of history which is accepted by the Academy, only adding that it is a bourgeois history which takes no account of the marxist contribution, well it is true that I have absolutely no sense of history! Sartre has, perhaps, a sense of history, but he doesn't do anything with it. What has he brought to history? Absolutely nothing! I think that he wanted to say something else, despite everything. He wanted to say that I do not respect the meaning of history accepted by all post-Hegelian philosophy in which processes are implied which must always be the same, such as, for example, the class struggle... Secondly, having a sense of history, in that sense of the word history, is to be always capable of carrrying out a totalisation, at the level of a society or a culture or a consciousness.

[...] It is true that I have absolutely no sense of that kind of history!" [Foucault's conception of history follows. It is noticeable that Foucault begins by failing to answer Sartre's criticism.]

## Departures

Marcel Jullian, the former director of Antenne 2, died on 28 June 2004. In November 1974, he suggested to Sartre a series of programs on his life and work, but the project was abandoned due to political pressure. The press scarcely mentioned this episode in Jullian's life, but he himself spoke at great length on the matter in an interview recorded before his death and included in a documentary by Annie Romand broadcast on France 2 on 8 July 2002.

Serge Reggiani, the well-known actor and singer, died in Paris on 23 July 2005, aged 82. In 1959, he played the role of Frantz von Gerlach in *Les Séquestrés d'Altona* marvellously (Michel Rybalka saw him perform at the théâtre de la Renaissance and can confirm this). A few years later, he began a singing career in singing using lyrics by Boris Vian. His reminiscences of Sartre were written in the form of a letter in his *Dernier Courrier avant la nuit* (Paris: L'Archipel, 1995, pp. 99-111). An obituary by Sylvain Siclier appeared in *Le Monde* on 24th July 2004.

Henri Cartier-Bresson the photographer, died on 3 August 2004, at the age of 95. He took the classic photo of Sartre in 1946 on the Pont des Arts, in which the writer, standing beside Jean Pouillon, is shown in a smoking a pipe and wearing a sheepskin-lined jacket. Cartier-Bresson took a number of photographs of Sartre, Beauvoir, Camus, and their circle. In 1954, Sartre wrote a nine-page preface for his album of photographs *D'une Chine à l'autre* (Paris : Delpire). The text was included in *Situations*, *V*.

An extract entitled "L'amour secret du Castor," with an introduction by Serge Lafaurie, appeared in *Le Nouvel Observateur*, 15-21 avril 2004, pp. 98-100. It includes a photo de Beauvoir in the playground of the lycée Molière in June 1939 and a photo of Bost around 1938.

Another extract entitled "Sexe, mensonges et correspondance," with an article by Jacques-Pierre Amette "Ces lettres qui ébranlent un mythe," appeared in *Le Point*, 15 avril 2004, pp. 100-103. There are photos of de Beauvoir, Olga Kosakiewicz, and Bost and Sartre as soldiers. Amette, who has a partial and partisan view of Sartre, thinks that Sartre and de Beauvoir are an ill-matched couple: "How can she live with this bespectacled fellow, with the metallic voice of a public prosecutor, a crumpled blue suit, obsessed by crabs, 'pederasts', roots, the mud of being, and Heideggerian jam, while she is full of drive, fire, freshness and wit. What a mystery..."

Bernard Frank, in his 'Chronique' in *Le Nouvel Observateur* (22-28 avril 2004, p. 92), thinks that Amette has read hardly any Sartre and de Beauvoir and thinks that he has simply lost his head.

[The correspondence is interrupted in February 1940, for the later letters from de Beauvoir have been lost. Lafaurie defines the moral code of Sartre and de Beauvoir as a couple thus: intellectual fidelity, physical liberty, and open relationships.]
